Earlier this term, we have welcomed Beatrice Glinche, the headteacher from our link school, I'ecole Ste Marie in Chaumes en Retz, France, and her three daughters. The children and Madame Glinche enjoyed a tour of the school and spent time in Reception, Year 5 and Year 6. Children were encouraged to welcome our visitors in French and to practise the vocabulary they know about how to present themselves. Some were even brave enough to have a go! Madame Glinche and the children enjoyed seeing how children at Braunston learn and how our school compares to I'ecole Ste Marie. Mrs Phipps visited the school in France this summer and we are looking forward to developing our links further over the coming year.

Our pupils have been active in making a difference to the lives of others showing respect and understanding. Sergeant Major O'Brien led us in our Remembrance Service and spoke about how diverse our world is but we must be ambitious in our pursuit of equality and inclusion in our society. The School Council sold poppies and merchandise and collectively we raised £309.84 in support of the Royal British Legion.

Our Anti-Bullying Committee helped to prepare activities used to help children to understand that we celebrate our differences and recognise how we are all the same in so many ways. The children raised £181.08 and know that this will be used to help "Children in Need".

We look forward to seeing you in school in the next couple of weeks.
















Reception Class - Inkpen

Reception have been learning all about the Hindu festival of Diwali and enjoyed listening to Mrs Gohil and Ava, who visited our class to share how they celebrate this special festival. We then had a go at creating some firework paintings by using splattering techniques and prints.

Our new topic this term is 'Bbbrrr... It's Cold Outside' and we have been identifying animals that live in cold parts of the world such as Antarctica and the Arctic. We have used our phonics knowledge to support our independent pieces of writing. We have also been comparing our own homes with shelters used in cold places such as igloos! In Maths we have been busy comparing circles and triangles and discussing whether these shapes are still the same if we rotate them or if they are different sizes. We concluded that a triangle is still a triangle if it has three straight edges and three corners and a circle is a circle with no corners and one curved edge.


about what our favourite foods to taste are.




Class 3 - Jamila


In maths, the children have completed their unit of addition and subtraction and are now moving on to explore multiplication and division. Keep practising those times tables at home!




Class 6 - Horowitz

Horowitz class have been extremely busy during the last few weeks and have continued to work with resilience and determination towards everything that they are asked to do.

In English, we have been reading 'Asha and the Spirit Bird', which is set in the foothills of the Himalayas, linking beautifully with our geography work on mountains. We have been getting in to character and writing a letter between two of the main characters in the story; in particular, we have been developing our use of formal language. We are really impressed with how they are applying their skills independently.

Our science topic this term is 'Light'. One of our scientific lines of enquiry was - can light travel around corners? We started to learn new vocabulary such as refraction and we wrote scientific descriptions for words such as shadow and reflection. The children made predictions about if they thought light could travel around corners and if so, how? We have also been learning about the journey of light from a primary source to our brain and what happens to the image when it reaches our eyes.
