Head Teacher's Welcome - issue 3

Dear Parents and Carers,

Despite the rain, the school community continues to flourish as we work hard to offer our vision of 'Learning for life in all its fullness'. John 10:10. This means that we plan to offer a rich and ambitious curriculum for all of our children and then provide many opportunities that enrich the lives of our students. Last week, children took part in sporting events, years 1-6 participated in a cricket taster session and many children visited FOBs Mother's Day Present Room. Children also participated in cross country, Dance Club (two sessions), Art Club, Sewing Club, Football, Spy Club and Basketball. These were all well attended.

Our School Diocesan Consultant, Mr Meekings, visited the school last week and went into every classroom to meet with the children and staff. This review enabled us to discuss our school ethos, vision and values and see them all in action. Mr Meekings wrote to say,

'Thank you so much for your warm welcome today. Walking around your school is always an absolute joy and what I heard, saw and felt sent me away with so much confidence, as always, that Braunston is truly a Church School that serves its pupils, families, staff and the local community well. You should be, and I know are, justifiably proud of all that the school stands for'.

Working as part of PDET facilitates a comprehensive People Development support partnership and last week, we had a Teaching and Learning Review in maths. The maths curriculum continues to be a strength at Braunston, and you can clearly see the impact of the times tables and KIRFs focus (Key Instant Recall Facts) in the children's learning. Thank you for supporting your child in knowing these key facts.

This week, teachers have carried out our Spring Term assessments. As part of our assessment strategy, we collect data three times a year by carrying out formal assessments to determine progress and identify any common trends. These assessments are delivered sensitively and the information gained is analysed and used to address misconceptions or gaps in learning in future planning.

We look forward to discussing your child's progress and sharing further updates with you as parents in the Parent/ Teacher consultations being held next week. Please make sure you have signed up to a meeting as it is our aim to communicate with all of our parents in the best interests of your child/children.

As you can see, we are managing to pack a lot in to the short term!

Our fabulous FOBS team have been working hard to support the school and, with your help, are busy raising funds for our new sensory area and improved environment around the pond. We are starting to think about designs and would welcome any of your ideas - please contact the school if you think that you can be of any help. Please see a message from FOBS below:

We have been overwhelmed by the support and generosity shown by parents and carers supporting FOBS events.

Reception - Inkpen

The Reception children have been very busy in their first week back at school. We have been exploring height and length. The children's maths vocabulary has been fantastic, they are able to use a variety of different words to describe how tall, short, long or small something is.

We have been finishing reading 'On Sudden Hill'. The children have thoroughly enjoyed and immersed themselves in the book. To finish off the book we have been exploring speech and thoughts. We have been using our inference skills to infer what the characters are feeling and their thoughts.

The children have enjoyed designing their dragon eyes, made out of clay. The children chose which tools they wanted to use to create the desired effect, all of the dragon eyes created where very individual and personal to the children.

We are revising all of the set 1 sounds in phonics and recapping set 2, with a big focus on sounding out and blending the words together.

Class 1 - Donaldson

The children in Year 1 have been very busy in and out of class this term! We have been busy making compasses and testing them in the playground to follow directions and points used on the compass. In English, we have been practising using words with the suffixes -ing, -ed, -er and -est and have been learning to find the difference in maths.

We are continuing learning all about materials in science and exploring the properties and explaining why certain materials might be better to make things with.

The children are really enjoying designing and making proto-types of bridges in our design and technology lessons. We cannot wait to see their finished models!







Class 2 - Ahlberg

Ahlberg class have returned to school after half term bright and bushy tailed ready for another exciting term.


In English we have started to read 'Dogger' by Shirley Hughes - possibly the best book ever written for 7 year olds! We are enjoying getting to know the characters and imagining ourselves in their shoes. I am really looking forward to reading the stunning writing inspired by this book in the next couple of weeks.

In maths we are conquering fractions. So far we have learned how to find half and quarter of quantities and shapes and we are now moving on to finding three quarters and thirds. So far, the children have been superb at grasping this sometimes tricky concept.



Well done Ahlbergs - a great start to the term.










Bertie - I love George's Marvellous Medicine so much I have read it twice. That is 104 pages + 104 pages = 208 pages!


Class 3 - Jamila

Class 3 have been working so hard across the curriculum! Class 4 - Morpurgo

In RE, we have been learning about the Hindu faith. Children in year 4 have kindly shared their knowledge, understanding and practice with the rest of the class. In DT, we have completed our felt purse. The children have worked so hard to research, design, make and evaluate their felt purse. In PE, we put our volleyball skills to the final test. We played mini matches across the class, demonstrating all of our skills from the term and impressing Mr Webb. Year 4 (and Mrs Oliver) love a healthy sporting competition!

Class 5 - Rowling

To finish off our unit of work about South America's rainforests, we put our design technology skills to good use. After exploring pop-up mechanisms, we designed and made a four page pop-up book: one to explain each layer of the rainforest. We made frogs whose mouths opened, sloths that hung from branches that arched out, harpy eagles that protruded from the emergent layer as well as many other fabulous designs, all dispersed with the information about the layers.

We also used our design skills, when completing our study of Judaism. After finding out all the features of a synagogue, we drew our bird's eye plans of the place of worship and labelled accordingly. We needed to ensure we had the Ark for the Torah, the eternal light and the Bimah platform for the Rabbi to stand on, as well as pews for men and women. Some children also realised a toilet was an essential too!

It was lovely to have one of Reverend Kathryn's friends visit us and talk about her everyday life and how she manages her disability. The children asked her some very thoughtful questions and it was lovely morning.


We are now very much looking forward to what the second half of the Spring term brings to us - hopefully some sunshine!














Class 6 - Horowitz

Class Horowitz have been busy since returning to school following half term. We have been looking at balanced arguments in our English lessons and had an interesting 'discussion' considering if watching television was a waste of time! In maths we have been looking at decimal numbers and ensuring that we know how to add, subtract, multiply and divide them accurately. Additionally, we have been trying out orienteering as well as gymnastics in PE and enjoying working in a team. In RE we have been investigating creation as it is written in the Bible. We have also welcomed Rev. Kathryn to Year 6 and she has led the discussion around Palm Sunday and Jesus's entry into Jerusalem as a peacemaker rather than a warrior. We shared our hopes for the world at this current time and wrote some of these onto palm leaves which we stuck onto 'the road to Jerusalem'. Forest School



Church and Community



Braunston School takes part in collective worship on a Wednesday morning. This is led by Reverend Kathryn and the church team. Additionally, Rev Kathryn has been focusing on Inclusion , Equality, Diversion and Justice. As a result there have been several visitors to the school from the wider church community who have shared their own story and the challenges that they may have faced. We have heard about ADHD, deafness and also Multiple Sclerosis from those people who know first hand how that impacts their daily life. After each special assembly, Rev Kathryn and the church community visitor have led a workshop in a classroom. This has allowed children in the classroom to ask questions and find out more information. This has been enjoyed by children and visitors alike and created a greater understanding of the challenges surrounding Inclusion , Equality, Diversion and Justice.

Spotlight on The Cabin

We are really lucky at Braunston to be able to offer a lunchtime nurture provision to the children. The Cabin is a safe, caring environment where children can come and spend some time

away from the hustle and bustle of the playground and classroom. It is open to all ages across the school and is very popular. Children are invited to access the Cabin by staff who have identified that the child may need a little extra support, for example they may be experiencing friendship difficulties, have worries they wish to share or are perhaps not feeling well enough to join their friends in the playground. Children can also put themselves forward for an invitation if they wish to do so and we often have small clubs set up by the children that use the Cabin as a base. For example, we have held a Computer Club, a Comic Club and a Jigsaw Club.

The Cabin is a really positive environment with games and activities designed to allow the children to work together and build friendships. It is not used as a punishment and children are not forced to attend. All children who do come along to the Cabin are made to feel welcome, and they are encouraged to work alongside each other to promote interaction, communication and teamwork, as well as giving them time to talk and share their feelings. The Cabin is a 'drop-in' club, so children are welcome to split their lunchtimes between the Cabin, eating lunch with their friends and spending time outside in the fresh air.

Since we started the Cabin, it has grown to be an integral part of lunchtimes at Braunston and it is always lovely to see the friendships developing across the age groups; improving wellbeing and creating a sense of belonging.
