## Class 1 - Donaldson



In the last week of term we plan to have an entire day dedicated to art. Our medium will be clay and the children will learn all sorts of modelling techniques through the lesson. I can't wait to see what we create!

In Maths we have been learning about units of measure and how to convert between them. We now know how to measure in mm, cm and m.

In Geography this week, we have been learning about earthquakes. We used our classroom tables to recreate the different ways that earthquakes can happen, depending on the type of tectonic plate boundary. We used a piece of Jenga to act as a building. We looked at the Ring of Fire in the Pacific Ocean and all decided we were much safer living in Northamptonshire away from any major tectonic plate boundaries!




## Class 5 - Rowling

#### Class 6 - Horowitz



### Forest School





## Wellbeing



One of the most important jobs we have is to ensure that the children in school are happy, settled and ready to learn. A huge part of this is to identify any issues early and offer support to children and parents as soon as possible.

Nationally, there is an increasing number of children showing anxiety surrounding coming to school. The earlier we can tackle any anxieties surrounding school the better so that we can avoid our children becoming school phobic and school refusers in the future.

It is normal for children to just not want to come to school at times, and we need to be mindful that feeling anxious about something does not mean that you have anxiety. However, if you are noticing a change in your child's wellbeing in terms of attending school, the following may be useful:
