Reception - Inkpen

Reception have had a fantastic start to term 5. We have been exploring Traditional Tales, starting with Little Red Riding Hood. We have looked at the language used in the stories: Once upon a time, Long long ago, they lived happily ever after..... along with exploring why we have the beginning, middle and end of a story.

The children have been immersing themselves fully in the story, we have had Little Red Riding Hood's basket that the children have been writing lists for to help Little Red Riding Hood do some shopping for Granny. Sometimes there were things from our lists left in the basket for us to use in our play. We

wrote Granny a get well soon card and posted them to her. She wrote back thanking us for sending such thoughtful and beautiful cards.

We had a visit from Reverend Kathryn. She came in and told us a lovely story about Alleluia and taught us a song to go with it. We made fantastic posters.

Reception have been using the new track on the top playground. The first time we used it we managed 8 laps. The second time we used it we managed 13 laps. What an improvement, well done Reception!

Class 1 - Donaldson

Year 1 are really excited about our forth coming visit to Twycross Zoo. Our science topic this term is all about animals! We have been learning to classify animals into amphibians, insects, reptiles etc. and creating fact-files about them. We are looking forward to sharing our knowledge during our visit.

In geography, we have been busy learning all about polar regions and discovering facts about the North and South Poles. Did you know that there is no land at all in the North Pole? It is just made up of enormous chunks of ice and snow!

In English, we have been revising our knowledge of suffixes and learning the rule of whether to add an 's' or 'es' to the end of a word when changing it into a plural. We have had lots of practice of changing words into plurals based on our text, 'Too Much Stuff!'

We are now introducing 'fractions' in our maths lessons, looking at halving quantities and shapes. Later on this term, we will begin to learn how to identify quarters.

Class 2 - Ahlberg

We have had such fun in Class 2 these past two weeks. In science, we have started to learn about seeds and plants and we had a fabulous afternoon digging up weeds last week to look closely at their roots. This week we have designed an experiment to find out what seeds need to grow. Some poor seeds have ended up in the freezer and in dark cupboards so we can test our theories. In D.T. we have been practising making moving pictures using slots, sliders, levers and pivots. The final result should be a 'Jack' that climbs a beanstalk ... if we have learned all the skills correctly!

In English, we have been reading our different versions of Jack and the Beanstalk and have just completed a longer write imagining we are Jack creeping into the giant's castle. The descriptions were fantastic! Finally, in maths we have been weighing in order to find the mass of different objects in grams and this week we will be using addition and subtraction to help us problem solve using our knowledge of weighing.

Class 3 - Jamila

Year 3 have been enjoying learning about the Ancient Egyptians. So far this term, we have had a go at mummifying an orange, making Ancient Egyptian flatbread and have visited the Ashmolean museum in Oxford to take part in an Ancient Egyptian afternoon. Our text this term has been a non-fiction book about the Ancient Egyptians. We are loving finding out lots of interesting facts about Egyptian life! We have written instructions on how to mummify a cat and have started to learn about the different gods. There are a lot!

In maths, we have been learning about fabulous fractions and in science we have been finding out about animals with exoskeletons and hydrostatic skeletons. We have been so busy!

Class 4 - Morpurgo

Morpurgo Class have really enjoyed listening to and reading all about Greek Mythology. We have been desperate to find out what is inside Pandora's box, we have been terrified to hear of a monstrous beast called The Minotaur and sadly, we learnt that the invention designed by Icarus and Daedalus didn't go to plan! Now, we are gripped by the tale of Medusa. This term, we will be creating our own mythological creature and writing a non-chronological report about their appearance, location, magical powers and their tragic death!

In maths, we are continuing to recap how to add and subtract fractions but also how to convert them into decimals. The children are getting very good at being able to tell the time, solve problems with time and link time to their everyday life. We are also regularly practising our times tables to make sure we are accurate and fast, ready for the multiplication test in June.

In history, we are researching about Ancient Greece. The stories, the creatures, the gods and goddesses are absolutely fascinating - we are hooked! In PE, we are continuing to enjoy athletics and taking part in the mile run. Our plan is to be strong athletes by the end of the term. This term in DT, we are designing our very own fruit crumble. Firstly, we have looked at different recipes and then we tried various fruit. Most of us really enjoyed tasting new fruit and can't wait to make our crumble.












Class 5 - Rowling




"We have enjoyed designing on 2Design and Make and are looking forward to making our boxes", agreed all of year 5, "but mostly we want to make our burgers!"

Focus On Sport
















Forest School

Did you know that in Northamptonshire we have access to a range of support from the 0-19 Universal Children's Services Teams?

They provide the Healthy Child Programme, a planned series of contacts (face to face or virtual via video call) with children and young people up to 19 years old and their families. These contacts are provided by a health visitor for children who are pre-school age, and school nurses who help to look after children who are school age.

The team also have an infant feeding support team, family nurses, and children's weight management and continence services.

Their aim is to support families across Northamptonshire providing a universal service for all, whilst also identifying those who might need specific help.
