Dear Parents, Carers and Children

October has arrived and so has the wet weather! Please make sure children bring coats to school as we endeavour to go outside in all conditions. We continue to teach in ventilated spaces, so recommend that children wear layers - particularly on the days that children do PE, as they are often outside.

This week, we have been challenged by staff shortages and the innocent cough and cold that is making its way around reception and year 1. Wherever possible, staff absence is covered within our usual staffing team, and we aim to make sure that teaching staff, who are known to the children, teach them. If this is not possible, then the class teaching assistants remain with the class to ensure consistency. If any communication between you and the class teacher remains unanswered for longer than 48 hours, please send the email to me or to the office.

Thank you for your support in working to keep COVID out of school. So far, we have been fortunate in the number of positive cases in school, and have appreciated how vigilant you have been in using Lateral Flow Tests and/ or taking your child to have a PCR test. If your child has been identified as a close contact, school will contact you and ask you to take your child for a PCR test. This system has prevented any spread within our bubbles and has meant that the overall majority of children are accessing a full curriculum within the school setting. Long may this continue!

Children who test positive and are well enough, can access our remote provision. This continues to be accessed via Google Classroom and is a mixture of live teaching and uploaded learning. Laptop computers can be made available if required, please contact the office.



Reception Class – Inkpen

A very warm welcome to our lovely Reception class. We hope you have enjoyed your first few weeks in school! We have been busy learning our class expectations and completing base line assessments in Literacy and Maths. We have begun learning set 1 sounds from our Phonics: Read, Write, Inc, as well as the first five rotten red words. These have been sent home for your children to continue learning ready for their first spelling quiz on 24th September. We have tried our hand at doing mud paintings using natural resources, such as feathers, leaves and twigs, as well as drawing self-portraits. These will be turned into Picasso inspired portraits using oil pastels. We cannot wait to see how these turn out!

The adults in Reception have been playing with the children and making observations, which are being uploaded onto our online learning journal – Tapestry. You should have now received your log-in details and be able to access your child's account. Please speak to an adult in Reception if you require assistance with this.


In history, children are finding out about The Stone Age and are discovering new knowledge daily. They are continuing to develop their writing skills and aiming to write in pen as soon as they can.




'Wrap Around Care' news

The changes to Wrap Around Care (Breakfast and After School Club) have been really positive, with the majority of children having a hot snack. In all honesty, we did not expect the changes to be as successful, nor did we expect the numbers to grow as much as they have.

There is a limit of 25 places in Wrap Around Care and several times this week we have been at capacity. We have amended the booking system to allow you to book up to 24 hours before the session and not 48 hours, however we are very restricted in offering emergency bookings. Please continue to plan ahead and contact the office if you have a genuine unforeseen emergency. Unfortunately, we may not be able to offer a space if the 25 places have already been allocated.

We have staff changes in the Wrap Around Care team. Miss Madge will no longer be our Wrap Around Care supervisor, although we are pleased to say that she continues to work in year 4 as their teaching assistant. Mrs Brand, who currently works in year 1 and as a lunchtime supervisor, joins the breakfast team from Monday.

Forest School news

Year 1 went foraging for all sorts of different nature treasures. They made potions for woodland creatures. We put all sorts of leaves, berries, flowers and soil in a cup and bashed them with mini sticks to mix them all together. We added a drop of water and then we took it in turn to smell each cup and share what we thought they smelled like - some said like pizza, water, minty like toothpaste.
